






Professionalism

- What is a professional? The Merriam-Webster dictionary defines professionalism as "the conduct, aims, or qualities that characterize or mark a profession or a professional person" and it defines profession as "a calling required specialized knowledge and often long and intensive academic preparation"
- What does it mean to be a professional? Acting like a professional means working and behaving in such a way that others think of them as competent, reliable, and respectful.

Professionalism continued

- Act like the professional that you want to be viewed as
- Speak to the BOE
- Schedule weekly or bi-weekly meetings with your supervisor and/or building administrator
- Volunteer to be on district committees
- Be a part of leadership teams in your building
- Ask for the date of a 504 or IEP meeting for a student that has complicated medical
 - Always prepare 1 or 2 solid suggestions
- Join Professional Organization membership, active, engaged

Building relationships

- Active listening
- Trust
- Symbiotic not adversarial
- Problem-solving mindset
- Connection
- Actively engaged
- Open communication



Difficult Conversations

- Relate
- "First seek to understand, then to be understood" (LIM Habit 5)
- Practice Empathic Listening
- Share "we want the same thing", "team", "together", "safe"
- Acknowledgement "that must be difficult"
- Always soften the conversation
- Understand opinions vary, stakes are high, emotions can run strong
- Practice, Practice

Problem-solving Mindset

- Always approach with a solution
- Speak their language
- Be a critical thinker
- Keep a broader perspective
- Win-Win approach
- Relate to CSIP!!!!!!!




