



Child sexual abuse refers to the involvement of a child (person less than 18 years old) in sexual activity that violates the laws or social taboos of society and that he/she/they:

- does not fully comprehend
- does not consent to or is unable to give informed consent to, or
- is not developmentally prepared for and cannot give consent to

The Issue

One in 10 children will be sexually abused before their 18th birthday.

Why authorities identify a non-representative percentage of child sexual abuse cases.

ROADBLOCKS TO REPORTING

Child victims of sexual abuse

Disclose during childhood (23-33%)

Disclose to legal authorities (6-15%)


1 Adolescent girls are at the highest risk

Increase in risk for experiencing violence later in life

This includes...

- Up to 10% of children are victimized in educational settings (Shakeshaft,2004)
- Approximately 1% of respondents reported CSA experienced in the context of Youth Serving Organizations. (Shattuck, Finkelhor, Turner, & Hamby, 2016).
- More than 70% of children who are sexually abused are abused by a peer. (Gerwirtz-Meyden & Finklehor, 2020)

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What?

A roadmap for organizations who value child safety and wellbeing



How?

- 3 hour workshop and 6 month collaborative period

These steps form a framework for preventing child sexual abuse.

They can help you become aware of the scope of the issue, take actionable steps toward both preventing and responding to abuse, and create safer environments for the children in your life. They act as a guide for developing protective behaviors against abuse.

LEARN THE FACTS

If we don't understand child sexual abuse, we can't end it.

It is highly likely that you know a child who has been or is being abused. Experts estimate that one in 10 children are sexually abused before their 18th birthday.

MINIMIZE OPPORTUNITY

Safe environments can help reduce the risk for abuse.

More than 80% of sexual abuse cases occur in isolated, one-on-one situations. Make sure interactions with children can be observed and interrupted.

TALK ABOUT IT

Talking openly breaks down barriers and reduces stigma.

Children often keep abuse a secret, but talking openly about our bodies, sex, and boundaries can encourage children to share and feel safe.

RECOGNIZE THE SIGNS

Signs of abuse aren't always obvious, but they are often there.

Emotional or behavioral changes are often the most common signs, rather than physical evidence. Trauma may be the root of what is typically labelled 'bad' or 'difficult' behavior.

REACT RESPONSIBLY

It's our responsibility to react appropriately to suspicion, disclosure, or discovery of abuse.

Only 4% to 8% of reports of all sexual abuse are false. Understand how to respond to risky behaviors and suspicions or reports of abuse.

As a mandated reporter, it can be difficult to keep up with new legislation and emerging child protection research. This training provides **up-to-date information** on the legal responsibilities of mandated reporters, the indicators of abuse and/or neglect, how to respond to suspicions of abuse and/or neglect and how and when to make a report.

The updated version includes education on: reporting bias, poverty vs. neglect, cultural responsiveness, child sexual abuse prevention education requirements for students and additional warning signs of child injuries.

• You are not required to provide proof. Anyone who makes a good faith report based on reasonable grounds is immune from prosecution.
